Discuss the Theme and Tragic Vision of *Women Beware Women* .

Women Beware Women is a dark Jacobean tragedy written by Thomas Middleton.

The play presents a corrupt world in which lust, greed, ambition, and moral weakness control human behavior. Middleton's tragic vision is not heroic or noble; instead, it is realistic and pessimistic, showing how uncontrolled desire leads to suffering and destruction, especially for women.
